Currently and for the last eight years, Martin has been the Clinical Researcher for the HIV focus community clinic to apply research for intervention treatments and justify the federal funding in San Juan, Puerto Rico. In 2016, Martin accepted a position at Texas Woman's University of Dallas, and in 2023, he was promoted to Associate Professor. While at Dallas, Martin has continued his work on motor control and neuromuscular deficiencies in people with HIV. His work led to the development of a balanced protocol that aids in the

understanding of standing motor alteration in people with HIV. Part of Martin's motivation for moving to Dallas was the Coordination of the Human Cadaver Laboratory. Martin developed an anatomy educational outreach activity in 2017. He has been involved with undergraduates, OTA students, OT, and nursing students thus far. He has served on several renowned committees at the facility, and he is a member of various prestigious organizations. Martin has over 70 refereed publications and is a national and international presenter.
