Membership

t has been my honor to serve as ASHT president for the past year, working alongside amazing volunteers and staff that have made this year successful in so many ways. ASHT has worked diligently to support the hand and upper extremity therapy community, identifying and developing new and useful benefits for members, and for this I offer all volunteers and staff a huge thank you!

ASHT recognizes the need to embrace and support members at all levels of their careers, from students and young therapists to those with decades of experience. Last year, ASHT began to offer a discounted membership rate for the first year of student membership and 115 students made the decision to join the organization! Our goal is for students to recognize the value ASHT offers and continue to support ASHT with their ongoing membership, as they are the future of the hand therapy specialty.

This past year, ASHT launched the Upper Extremity Institute, an online, free to ASHT members, study group for novice therapists, as well as change of career therapists. The course has attracted a huge following, with 984 registrants!

To meet the continuing education needs across levels of experience, you will find varying educational opportunities including webinars, live and online courses, Journal Club chats, as well as the annual meeting.

In support of members interested in professional growth, ASHT recently implemented an e-Community for emerging leaders, which has seen positive, energetic activity. The ASHT Board of Directors will also host a luncheon at the annual meeting to review volunteer opportunities within ASHT and discuss effective communication strategies utilized by effective leaders.

The Education Division continues to expand the number of course offerings and is working to update the *Test Prep for the CHT Exam*. Significantly more members are participating in the Research Division's Journal Club chats to enhance their understanding of relevant research articles. As the Research Division works to expand *Clinical Assessment Recommendations*, *3rd ed.* stay tuned for additional chapters as they are added.

The Practice Division continued to keep members informed of current issues and legislation impacting access to and the delivery of rehabilitation services. ASHT will host a Virtual Capitol Hill Day in conjunction with this year's annual meeting in Washington, D.C. This will enable all members, whether at home or in attendance at the conference to participate. I encourage you to visit the ASHT Legislative Action Center, an important member benefit, to raise your voice.

As we encourage members to find time to get involved with ASHT, the process of volunteering has been automated with the launch of the Online Volunteer Portal. Members can now view available volunteer positions and apply directly from the ASHT website. For those who would like to volunteer but don't think they have adequate time, there are short, bite-size microvolunteering opportunities available.

This year also saw the IFSSH/IFSHT Triennial Congress take place in Berlin, Germany. As ASHT strives to have a global impact on the development of hand therapy, I was excited to meet therapists from around the world as I served as the ASHT Delegate to IFSSH/IFSHT. Congratulations to Evelyn Mackin and Judy Colditz, who among others were honored with the IFSHT Lifetime Achievement Awards for their contributions to hand therapy internationally, and to Judy Bell-Krotosky, who posthumously received the Cristina Alegri Award for Innovation in Hand Therapy. Plans are underway for the 2025 Triennial Congress, as ASHT and ASSH placed a successful bid to host the Congress during that year in Washington, D.C.

ASHT continues to have an ongoing global outreach through the Companion Clinic Program and International Visitors Program, thanks to the efforts of the international committee. Positive feedback regarding the impact the International Visitors Program has made in developing countries makes it even more exciting to announce that there are plans underway to make the program a sustainable annual event.

Thank you to each and every member, volunteer and staff for your support of this amazing organization, whose growth will serve to secure the future of hand therapy and allow us to continue to have an impact in our clients' lives by obtaining the best outcomes.



Year in Review

Calendar cycle 2018-2019 was characterized by significant activities within each of the three pillars of ASHT's mission: Education, Research and Practice.

Education

ASHT's Education Division continued to build on its commitment to growing the hand therapy specialty for members and non-members alike. The society's educational portfolio has expanded through live meetings, online education and publications. ASHT's activities included:

HAND THERAPY REVIEW COURSE

 Organized and hosted four courses (288 attendees). Our second year in Atlanta included the addition of the popular cadaver lab component.

HANDS ON ORTHOTICS

Organized and hosted a record 13 workshops (195 attendees).
 This course continues to grow in popularity and is ASHT's most requested face-to-face course. ASHT will again host a Hands On Orthotics pre-conference course at the annual meeting, with this year's focus on simplifying static progressive orthoses.

TRAVELING COURSE

Organized and hosted five courses (76 attendees). Education
on Tour, which debuted in the fall of 2018 continues to grow
in popularity, with an expanded list of requests for 2020.
 Before year end, ASHT will announce a third addition to the
roster of traveling course topics.

UPPER EXTREMITY INSTITUTE

Organized and hosted nine live online sessions (984
 attendees). This course is an online study tool designed
 for novice therapists as well as change of career therapists.
 The program is free to ASHT members and runs monthly
 September through May.

WEBINARS

Organized and hosted 12 live webinars (1,141 participants).
 ASHT collaborated with the Research and Practice Divisions and our physician-partner organizations (AAHS, AAOS and ASSH) and industry suppliers to deliver a variety of topics.

TEST PREP FOR THE CHT EXAM, 3RD ED.

This publication continues to be a best-seller in the ASHT
 online store and a valuable resource for referencing
 relevant anatomy, surgical procedures, treatment guidelines,
 progression and orthotic regimens for the various diagnoses
 that therapists treat on a daily basis. Stay tuned for
 chapter updates.

PATIENT EDUCATION RESOURCES

- Completed and published three new Patient Education
 Resources. This series of resources is intended for therapists
 to use as a convenient tool for patient care. The flyers
 provide information on common diagnoses, answer
 frequently asked questions and educate patients on the role
 a hand therapist plays in their treatment. Newly released
 topics include:
 - » Raynaud's disease
 - » Complex Regional Pain Syndrome
 - » Tendon Transfers
 - » Arthritis (in Spanish) coming soon
 - » Distal Radius Fracture (in Spanish) coming soon
 - » Trigger Finger (in Spanish) coming soon

VIDEO SERIES

Launched a <u>video series</u> to offer even more at-home continuing education opportunities. The first in the series

 "CMC Arthroplasty: Post-op Expectations, Evaluation,
 Treatment and Outcomes" is a series of three 10-minute videos that takes you through the initial evaluation process, continues with the fabrication of a volar forearm-based

CMC thumb spica orthosis which will be utilized for the time period designated by the surgeon and demonstrates the reassessment process and the advancement of the post-operative rehabilitation program.

MENTORING PROGRAM

 Encouraged and promoted networking and professional development through ASHT's Mentoring Program. Created online resources, including a mentoring handbook, selfassessment tools, videos and a contract template. Facilitated discussions and introductions via the mentoring e-Community page to help mentors and mentees find one another.

RAPID FIRE LEARNING

 Provided content for the Test Your Knowledge column in the ASHT Times

ONLINE DISCUSSIONS

Generated and facilitated discussion on the ASHT
 e-Community specific to the hand therapy certification exam
 and provided a place for course attendees to ask questions,
 share experiences and post testimonials or suggestions
 and for attendees to ask presenters questions after each
 educational activity.

STUDENTS

 Developing new offerings for ASHT student members, including a competency assessment exam and a hand therapy club guidebook.





YEAR IN REVIEW

Practice

ASHT remains dedicated to developing resources and support material for day-to-day practice issues. The Practice Division comprises three committees working to keep members informed about legislation, regulation and industry trends affecting the delivery and reimbursement of hand therapy services. To further the goals of advocating for the hand therapy specialty, ASHT has hired and regularly collaborates with a legislative consultant. Practice Division volunteers researched and responded to email and phone inquiries, and fielded e-Community questions about regulatory, reimbursement and general practice issues. The society's Practice Division activities included:

ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

- Developed and published an Advocacy Toolbox on the ASHT website
- Reviewed legislation introduced into both the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate for potential impact on the delivery of hand therapy services
- Identified and developed content for the <u>ASHT Legislative</u>
 Action Center
- Tracked developments in the evolving debate over pain management, telehealth and research legislation
- Represented ASHT by presenting at AOTA's Specialty Conference on Adult Rehabilitation
- Represented ASHT at the APTA Federal Forum and AOTA Capitol Hill Day
- Contributed to regional and geographical distribution to develop the ASHT State Representative Initiative
- Created new micro-volunteering opportunities for members to contribute as state liaisons

FEDERAL AND STATE REGULATIONS COMMITTEE

- Followed proposed payment updates and regulatory changes issued by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)
- Researched and responded to email and phone inquires
- Researched and advocated for ASHT on issues concerning:
 - » Orthotics and Prosthetics
 - » Medicare Therapy Cap Repeal
 - » Pain Management Best Practices Inter-Agency Task Force Act
 - » Medicare Physician Fee Schedule
 - » Funding to support rehabilitation research
- Represented ASHT at the AOTA Annual Meeting and APTA Combined Sections Meeting

PRACTICE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE


- Reviewed and updated the CMS orthotics code list and coding information on the ASHT website (L Code Dictionary)

 - » Marketing and communications toolbox



Research

Research is critical to ensure the viability and advancement of hand and upper extremity therapy. ASHT is committed to supporting a generation of evidence-informed research to promote hand therapy clinical practice. The society disseminated and promoted research on hand and upper extremity conditions to members through the following activities:

- Organized and hosted monthly Journal Club chats, the official online forum for the *Journal of Hand Therapy* (635 participants)
- Awarded four research awards for the 2018 Annual Meeting:





Membership Engagement

As the leading voice for the hand therapy community, ASHT strives to provide education, innovation and practice guidance for its members. These goals can only be reached through active involvement by members. Here are some of the ways ASHT is working to increase membership participation in the society.

ONLINE VOLUNTEER PORTAL

In response to concerns voiced by members about limited volunteer options, the ASHT board of directors tasked committees and Divisions with creating more opportunities for member participation. Additionally, ASHT launched a new online volunteer portal. This platform allows members to register their interest, expertise, and availability and allows ASHT leadership to match members with the skill sets needed for moving initiatives forward. Both long and short-term commitment options are available including micro-volunteering projects.

TIP OF THE WEEK

This new program was developed from member feedback requesting quick practice ideas to simplify daily patient care. The initial biweekly post "Tip of the Week" was featured July 17, 2018 on ASHT's Facebook page. Since then, members and non-members have shared innovative treatment ideas and solutions, including photos and videos showcasing tremendous creativity. These tips have been shared by followers on other social media platforms, extending ASHT's reach.

e-COMMUNITY

The ASHT e-Community is the place for members to collaborate with fellow ASHT members, identify resources, share ideas, ask questions about challenging cases and discuss general topics of interest.

REGIONAL HAND THERAPY INTEREST GROUPS

The ASHT community outreach program is designed to promote new relationships and to build upon existing relationships with all local and regional hand therapy groups. ASHT's vision is to provide quarterly updates that are pertinent to the existence and growth of hand therapy within these smaller groups, through sharing of information. ASHT also welcomes the opportunity to purchase a vendor table when smaller regional groups hold meetings where vendors are invited to participate.

Ultimately, ASHT would like to develop channels for sharing resources and information throughout the entire country. Reciprocally, ASHT posts announcements of upcoming meetings and educational offerings from all interested groups in the ASHT Times. The section in the ASHT Times, called "What's Happening?," will continue to be a platform for communication with these groups. All interested local and regional hand therapy groups are welcome and invited to participate.





Leadership Development

Development of future leaders within ASHT is a key organizational goal for increasing the presence and sustainability of hand therapy in healthcare.

This year, ASHT implemented a variety of initiatives, providing members with resources and opportunities to achieve their professional goals:

- e-Community Discussion Group: The Emerging Leaders
 e-Community was created for ASHT members to learn
 more about leadership within ASHT at all levels, share
 volunteer opportunities and facilitate conversation among
 members in order to further their careers as leaders in the
 hand therapy community.
- Online Volunteer Portal: Purposeful promotion of the new online volunteer platform, engaging members to apply and pursue volunteer and leadership positions within ASHT
- Leadership Luncheon: Inaugural opportunity at the 2019
 ASHT Annual Meeting for members to network, learn how to
 navigate and engage in volunteer opportunities within ASHT
 and identify effective communication strategies utilized by
 effective leaders.

- LEAD Forum: The ASHT LEAD (Leadership Education and Discovery) Forum provides members an interactive opportunity to discuss leadership development, education and resources, and gain additional confidence and strategies for success in their own professional and personal settings. LEAD Forum activities include the ASHT Virtual Book Club and TED Talk discussions.
- Board Intern: Continued implementation of the board intern
 position. This opportunity introduces members to the process
 of board governance, nonprofit budget development and
 ASHT activities. The position also helps the intern develop
 leadership skills that could evolve to future participation as a
 committee chair, division director or board member.

HandCare.org

In 2015, ASHT partnered with the American Society for Surgery of the Hand (ASSH) to provide important information to patients and the public through ASSH's **HandCare.org** blog.

ach month, ASHT's Technology and Communication Committee contributes a piece focused on the value of hand therapy, authored by committee members and ASHT volunteers. This information has become some of our most shared posts on social media, helping our therapists share the importance of hand therapy with the public.

Between October 2018 and August 2019, the HandCare.org blog received 974,593 overall views. According to ASSH's metrics, ASHT-generated content accounted for about 16% of traffic on the HandCare.org blog.

Four of the blog's top 25 most read posts (#3 cubital tunnel syndrome, #12 wrist pain, #14 trigger finger, #17 mallet finger) were ASHT contributions. "Advice from a Hand Therapist: Cubital Tunnel Syndrome" — which was the third most popular post on the blog in 2018 — was viewed more than 40,000 times.

Hand Therapy Week 2019

ASHT experienced a successful Hand Therapy Week this year, due in part to the release of another hand safety and injury prevention video, dedicated volunteer efforts and a highly engaged audience both among the membership and social media.

he Hand Therapy Week page on the ASHT website earned nearly 2.5% more traffic during this time than last year. The Hand Therapy Week ideas page landed among the top 10 most-accessed pages on the website for the first time, demonstrating an increased interest in participating in this event and promoting the hand therapy specialty.

HAND SAFETY & INJURY PREVENTION VIDEOS

Working in tandem with AH's digital media team, the Technology & Communication Committee produced the third video in its series of hand safety and injury prevention videos. This video focused



on desk ergonomics, sharing tips for keeping the hand and upper extremity safe and an on-camera CHT sharing information about the specialty.

This video was among the most popular post on ASHT's social media throughout Hand Therapy Week. The video post on Facebook reached 3.3K individuals and had 757 views on Youtube — **more than any other video currently on ASHT's YouTube channel.**

Due to the timeliness of the topic, the gardening safety video – which debuted during Hand Therapy Week 2018 – was reposted during Hand Therapy Week 2019. The video reached 3.7K individuals and was shared 65 times.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES/PROMOTION

The Patient Education Committee developed three new patient education resources: Raynaud's disease, CRPS and tendon transfers. This series of resources is intended for therapists to use as a convenient tool for patient care. The flyers provide information on common diagnoses, answer frequently asked questions and educate patients on the role a hand therapist plays in their treatment.

The Patient Education Resource page was accessed 619 times during Hand Therapy Week (nearly 200 more visits to this page than Hand Therapy Week 2018), making up about 2.35% of website traffic and ranking fourth among page views:

SOCIAL MEDIA ENGAGEMENT

Facebook

Activity on the ASHT Facebook page surged during Hand Therapy Week 2019. The page's total reach — number of individuals receiving any activity from the page, including posts to the page, posts by other people, page likes, ads, mentions and check ins — peaked at 6.8K at the start of Hand Therapy Week. The page also picked up 85 new followers over the course of the week.

The ASHT Photo Contest album recorded the highest reach of all posts during Hand Therapy Week (6.8K). Other popular posts included the "Are you ready for Hand Therapy Week?" teaser, Hand Therapy Week kick-off posts, the hand safety and injury prevention videos and posts highlighting grassroots Hand Therapy Week celebrations.

During Hand Therapy Week 2019, the ASHT Twitter page earned 12.3K impressions. This period of time marked a year-high for 2019. The American Hand Therapy Foundation (AHTF) had an exciting 2018-2019 year of collaboration and growth. AHTF remains the only professional organization with the sole mission of supporting researchers to expand the scientific evidence for hand therapy, in order to enhance the quality of hand and upper extremity rehabilitation and optimize patient outcomes.

In its nearly 30-year history, AHTF has provided hundreds of thousands of dollars in funding for over 100 projects. These projects have impacted our profession and many of your colleagues have been recipients of an AHTF grant or scholarship. The foundation is grateful to all who participate in donating to fund AHTF grants and encourage full participation to help enhance our collective professional future.

- In 2019, AHTF awarded nearly \$40,000 in grant funding to projects to benefit the practice of hand therapy, making this the most significant funding cycle in the history of the foundation. 
Foundation, whose mission is to improve patient outcomes by promoting evidence-based practice through funding clinical and scientific research and education, is an excellent organization and worthy of your support.


Hand Therapy Certification Commission


The number of Certified Hand Therapists (CHTs) continues to grow. There are currently 6,905 (CHTs) worldwide, a record number. There are 6,332 in the United States, 230 in Canada and 343 in countries outside of North America (see map below). By profession 86% are occupational therapists, 13% are physical therapists and less than 1% possess a dual OT/PT credential.



HTCC staff approved 16,000 professional development hours and nearly 3 million work hours in 2018.








EXAMINATION HIGHLIGHTS

The number of therapists taking the exam in 2018 was the second largest number since 2002. The overall pass rate (percentage of people who passed the examination) was 62%, which was consistent with previous years. The passing rate by year for the CHT examination since 2007 has ranged from 53% to 62% with the average pass rate being 58%. The mean passing rate for the past five years has been 61%. The passing rate for the May 2019 exam was 60%.



There were over 96,000 visits to the "Find a CHT" section on the HTCC website in 2018.

RECERTIFICATION HIGHLIGHTS

HTCC continues to show a very high recertification rate with over 92% recertifying on average since 2006. The table above shows the recertification rate by year since 2006.



HTCC now allows one hour of credit towards recertification in Category G for every year a therapist is a member of their national hand therapy association such as ASHT.

PRACTICE ANALYSIS

HTCC is conducting its sixth *Practice Analysis Survey of Hand Therapy Practice* this year. Practice analysis is a process that HTCC conducts every five years to ensure that each CHT examination accurately reflects the knowledge base required of individuals currently working in the field. HTCC has contracted with a company, Castle Worldwide, to conduct the 2019 study.

In March the Practice Analysis Task Force (PATF) convened to carefully review the hand therapy scope of practice and to develop the practice analysis survey. The PATF is comprised of CHTs who reflect the diversity of hand therapy practice. The task force consists of OTs and PTs who are hand therapy educators and employers as well as hand therapists with varying years of experience and from a variety of practice settings and geographic locations.





ALLIED ORGANIZATIONS UPDATE

The full survey is being launched from September and will be open to all CHTs through mid-October. The results of the survey will be published sometime in 2020. All CHTs are encouraged to complete this important survey.

SALARY SURVEY

HTCC conducted a salary survey in April 2019. This is the eighth salary and benefits survey that HTCC has performed since 2004. The purposes of the survey are to obtain information frequently requested by therapists and employers, to serve as a resource to the hand therapy community by sharing information, and to track ongoing data and trends. A total of 3,111 therapists completed the survey and the results will be published in the fall of 2019 on the HTCC website.

MARKETING

In 2019 HTCC exhibited at the APTA Combined Sections Meeting, the Philadelphia Hand Symposium, the American Occupational Therapy Association Annual Conference and ASHT's Annual Meeting. HTCC exhibited for the first time in the fall of 2018 at the APTA Student Conclave. HTCC also placed a marketing

advertisement in the Canadian Society of Hand Therapists (CSHT) 2019 conference program and sent brochures and promotional items for the CSHT conference as well as the Australian Hand Therapy Association's 2019 conference.

HTCC continues to host *CHT Exam Preparation Panels* at both the Philadelphia and ASHT meetings. Panel members consist of newly certified hand therapists who share their study strategies

The Academy of Hand and Upper Extremity Physical Therapy

The Academy of Hand and Upper Extremity Physical Therapy is one of 19 specialty components within the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA). Members of the Academy must be members of the APTA and include physical therapists, physical therapist assistants, and physical therapy students. The Academy does offer a partner program for other therapy and research professionals not eligible for APTA membership. Anyone interested in learning more about the partner program should contact hand@apta.org.

The Academy promotes rehabilitation of the hand and upper extremity within the profession of physical therapy, the medical community, and the general public. The Academy serves to mentor, educate, promote research and respond to the ever changing needs and interests of its membership. The Academy serves to enhance the awareness and interest to the specialty of

hand therapy amongst physical therapy professionals by providing effective mentoring by experienced clinicians, and information about educational opportunities.

The Academy is governed by a board of directors (five members) all of whom are physical therapists, certified hand therapists and members of the ASHT. The current board members include Jane Fedorczyk, PT, PhD, CHT (President), Mia Erickson, PT, EdD, CHT (Vice President), Scott Stevenson, PT, DPT, CHT (Secretary), Leah Michelsen, PT, DPT, CHT (Treasurer), and Emily Altman, PT, DPT, CHT, OCS. Each of these individuals is dedicated to advancing the profession of hand therapy by advocating for interprofessional practice and scholarship. There are 20 members of the Academy serving in leadership roles to support research, education, student initiatives, practice issues, and governance activities. Some of these individuals are also engaged members of the ASHT and HTCC. Over the past two years, the Academy has created improved infrastructure in the leadership team, completed a governance review and bylaws revision, and increased communication with other hand organizations including ASHT and HTCC.

The Academy sponsors educational programming and research presentations, in both platform and poster format, during the annual APTA Combined Sections Meeting typically held in February. Each year the Academy sponsors between 16-24 hours of continuing education related to hand and upper extremity

rehabilitation. Leaders of ASHT and HTCC are invited to attend an open forum with the Academy leaders during the APTA Combined Sections Meeting as well. The same courtesy is extended by ASHT for the President of the Hand PT Academy to attend meetings held during the ASHT Annual Meeting.

Members of the Academy are currently involved in the development of clinical practice guidelines (CPG). In May 2019, a CPG on Hand Pain and Sensory Deficits: Carpal Tunnel Syndrome was published in the Journal of Orthopaedic and Sports Physical Therapy (JOSPT). CPGs on lateral elbow tendinopathy and distal radius fractures are in process and should be available in 2020. CPGs are required to be open access resources to all health professionals. You will be able to access these CPGs via the Academy website or https://www.orthopt.org/content/ practice-clinical-practice-guidelines as the first three CPGs are a combined effort between the Hand PT Academy and the Academy of Orthopaedic Physical Therapy. Ann Lucado, PT, PhD, CHT, serves as the CPG coordinator and chairs the research committee for the Hand PT Academy. She is developing plans for future CPGs to address more specialized conditions within hand therapy.

The leaders of the Academy of Hand and Upper Extremity Physical Therapy look forward to continued interprofessional activities with leaders of the ASHT, HTCC, and other hand therapy related professional organizations.



International Federation of Societies for Hand Therapy

IFSHT TRIENNIAL CONGRESS -JUNE 2019 - BERLIN

A hugely successful congress was held in Berlin jointly between IFSHT and IFSSH. It was the largest hand congress ever recorded with 4,001 participants, including over 700 therapists. A record-breaking 92 countries were represented. Throughout the week there were up to 10 parallel sessions running all of which were equally accessible to hand therapists and hand surgeons. Topics were extremely broad and included microsurgery, congenital hand anomalies, Dupuytren's, wrist pathologies, fractures, the brain and the hand, nerve pathologies and ways innovation can influence and improve the patient experience. It was excellent to see the podium shared between therapists and surgeons both in the planned joint sessions and throughout the week showcasing the symbiotic relationship between the two professions.

The social program gave additional opportunities for cross country and cross professional liaison in informal settings. The Congress organizing team showed how ambition and organizational skills can be used to deliver an excellent experience.

Future Triennial Congresses

The 2022 International Congress, again shared between IFSHT and IFSSH, will be held in London, UK from 27th June to 1st July. <u>Sign up now</u> to register your interest. Plans are already underway to make this another memorable learning and networking experience in one of the most iconic cities in the world.

ASSH, AAHS and ASHT won the bid to host the 2025 International Congress in Washington, D.C. More information about this congress will be available following the 2022 meeting.

IFSHT MEMBERSHIP

Membership in IFSHT is available to countries with hand therapy societies (as full members), to those with a small group of therapists working toward development of a hand therapy society (as associate members) and to individuals in developing countries where hand therapy is in its infancy (corresponding members). IFSHT now has 37

full members. All individual members of the full member societies are automatically members of IFSHT and therefore IFSHT represents approximately 10,000 hand therapists worldwide.

IFSHT also has eight associate members and 10 corresponding members. Finally, IFSHT has six regional or surgical groups as "regional liaison organizations."  is a therapy article in each publication. Here you'll find the
 PDF versions of the back copies of this very informative
 magazine full of scientific and clinical articles.
- IFSHT Connections Newsletter is produced two to three times per year. You can sign up here to receive this newsletter.
- Facebook IFSHT is relatively new to using social media.
 Please add IFSHT to your groups and participate in the conversations.
- The IFSHT website holds an enormous amount of information for hand therapists, including all the above publications, information about member countries, education opportunities and resources, future congresses and awards and grants. If you have a patient heading on holiday or moving countries, this is a great place to find help in sourcing a local hand therapist. All member countries offer the service of attempting to locate someone suitable for you and your patient. If you are thinking of travelling abroad to work, there is also advice regarding the logistics of such a move.

IFSHT AWARDS AND SPONSORSHIP ACTIVITY

This year, at the Triennial Congress in Berlin, IFSHT awarded the first Lifetime Achievement Awards. This prestigious award is open for all member societies to nominate their members who have made a significant contribution to international hand therapy. This year, 13 awards were given. We were delighted to honor two American hand therapists for their international contribution to hand therapy: Judy Colditz and Evelyn Mackin. If you know a hand therapist that you think reaches the criteria set by IFSHT, follow this Link to read the details and then liaise with the President of ASHT to ensure a nomination for the next round of awards in 2022.

There are many other awards and grants available through IFSHT:

- Evelyn Mackin Award: Sponsorship of a therapist(s) from a
 developing country to attend the Triennial Congress. In 2019,
 IFSHT fully supported four therapists to attend the congress.
 Therapists were from Bhutan, Zimbabwe, Estonia and Poland.
 IFSHT booked and paid for flights, accommodation and
 full registration.
- IFSSH/IFSHT Triennial Congress Travel Grant: Eighteen applicants received funds to support, registration, accommodation and/or travel. Funds were distributed based on guidelines, specifically for countries with low GDP, for associate members who had not attended the

Congress previously, with funds from the 2016 Silent Auction specifically used to support speakers and poster presenters.

- IFSHT-IFSSH International Hand Therapy Teaching Awards:
 During this term, grants made available to support therapists teaching hand therapy in less-developed countries have increased to \$1,500 USD. Four applications were received and support offered to:
 - » Jane Fedorczyk (USA) travelled to Rwanda in April 2018 (funds not required)
 - » Jenny Ball (Australia) travelled to Nepal in May 2018
 - » Meryl Glover (UK) travelled to Malawi in October 2018
 - » Shrikant Chinchalkar (Canada) travelled to Sri Lanka in February 2019
 - » If you would like to explore the teaching opportunities around the world, follow this <u>link</u> and apply for financial support.
- Cristina Alegri Award for Innovation in Hand Therapy was awarded to Judy Bell-Krotoski who was voted by a blinded committee from a group of eight worthy nominations. Click here for a summary of these nominations.


In this next triennium, IFSHT will be working hard to:

ASHT Membership by the Numbers

Years of Hand Therapy Experience

Approximately one third (33%) of ASHT members have practiced hand therapy and upper extremity rehabilitation for 26 years or more. Almost 3 in 10 (29%) members have been in practice between 16 and 25 years, while nearly 1 in 5 (18%) have 6 to 15 years of practice experience. Approximately 1 in 5 (20%) members have practiced five years or fewer.
