


Why Should I Refer My Patient to a Hand Therapist?

Hand therapists are occupational or physical therapists who, through advanced study and experience, **specialize** in treating individuals with conditions affecting the hands and upper extremity.

To obtain the CHT credential, a hand therapist must practice as an OT or PT for a minimum of **three years**, accumulating at least **4,000 hours** of hand and upper extremity experience. Hand therapists must also pass a rigorous certification examination to demonstrate their competency in the practice of hand therapy.

Hand therapists have extensive **knowledge** and **experience** with regard to upper extremity anatomy, physiology and tissue healing and possess a mastery of post-operative protocols for complex conditions.




What Can Hand Therapists Do For My Patients?
